

HISTORY OF INDIANA DETENTION STANDARDS

1981 – 1st Standards developed

1989 – Indiana out-of-compliance with JJDPA

- In danger of losing \$1 million in grant funds
- 7,372 violations of Jail Removal (JJDPA)
- 10 Juvenile Detention Centers

June, 1991 – 1st Detention Standards – Advisory Committee appointed

Senate Enrolled Act #313 (1992) – removal of juveniles from jails, Indiana back in compliance

January 31, 1996 – Juvenile Detention Standards adopted

Standards updated in 2002 and 2008

Current Standards are due to expire the end of 2016




1,113 secure detention beds in Indiana


14,955 admissions in 2013

39% of youth enter and leave detention in 2 days or less

31% of youth entering detention in 2013 were detained longer than 14 days (over 4,500 youth)

New:

Total of 286 Standards w/ 42 mandatory

- 52 = new
